Richmond upon Thames Community Safety Survey 2017

Results Report

1. Introduction

This report sets out the key findings from the Richmond upon Thames Community Safety Survey 2017 which was conducted from 12 June 2017 to 10 July 2017.

The consultation provided an opportunity for residents and stakeholders to help shape the priorities for the Richmond Community Safety Partnership for 2017-2018. The partnership is made up of the Council, Police, Fire Service, Community Rehabilitation Company, National Probation Service, Achieving for Children, Richmond Housing Partnership, Safer Neighbourhood Board and Victim Support.

The purpose of the consultation was to understand what priorities residents and stakeholders thought should be set for the partnership and the borough as a whole, as well as to identify the most important issues for them in the local area.

A more detailed background to the survey can be found in Appendix 1.

2. Methodology

Data was gathered using an online questionnaire hosted on Richmond Council's consultation portal¹. A copy of the questionnaire can be found in Appendix 1.

The survey was publicised on Richmond Council's website, in the local press², via social media and by email to community groups. Paper copies of the questionnaire were available at the Civic Centre, Twickenham and by post on request.

The responses were analysed and reported by the Council's Consultation Team on an anonymous basis under the guidelines of the Data Protection Act.

Please note that percentages in this report may not add up to 100 due to rounding.

3. Response

There were **67** responses to the survey.


4. Results

Priority 1: Safer Neighbourhoods

Which of the following issues do you think are most important to focus on to create safer neighbourhoods for the borough of Richmond? (Please select up to 3)

This was a multiple choice question where respondents were able to select up to three of the listed options.

In all, there were 64 responses to this question. The top three issues selected by respondents were anti-social behaviour, burglary, and increasing neighbourhood policing.


Priority 2: Reducing Adult Offending and Re-offending Which of the following issues do you think are most important to focus on to reduce adult offending and re-offending in the borough of Richmond? (Please select up to 3)

This was a multiple choice question where respondents were able to select up to three options. 66 respondents answered this question, and the three most commonly selected issues were as follows:

- 1. Using the Integrated Offender Management team to tackle our most prolific offenders
- 2. Improving access to substance misuse services for offenders driven by abuse and addiction
- 3. Managing high harm offenders (serious and/or violent crime)




Priority 3: Tackle Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG)

This was a multiple choice question where respondents were able to select up to three options.

66 people answered this question and the two most commonly selected issues were protecting and supporting high risk victims of domestic abuse and violence and tackling offenders and bringing them to justice by working with the Magistrates Court and Witness Service.




Priority 4: Standing Together to Tackle Hate Crime, Radicalisation and Extremism

Which of the following issues do you think are most important to focus on to tackle hate crime, radicalisation and extremism in the borough of Richmond? (Please select up to 3)

This was a multiple choice question where respondents were able to select up to three of the listed options.

In all, there were 65 respondents to this question. The most commonly selected issue to focus on was 'increasing work in schools to increase awareness of and reduce radicalisation (chosen by 85% of respondents). This is illustrated in the graph and table below.


Priority 5: Keep Children and Young People Safe Which of the following issues do you think are most important to focus on to keep children and young people safe in the borough of Richmond? (Please select up to 3)

This was a multiple choice question where respondents were able to select up to three options and 65 people provided their views.

The three most commonly selected issues to keep children and young people safe were as follows:

- 1. Increasing support to children and young people with emotional and mental health problems
- 2. Improving support in schools for children and young people living in homes with domestic abuse and violence
- 3. Tackling young offenders, reducing the numbers of young people involved in the criminal justice system for the first time and reducing repeat offending

This is highlighted in the graph and table below.

What are you most concerned about in the local area where you live, work or study?

This was an open question which allowed respondents to describe their concerns about the local area where they live, work and or study. In total, 60 respondents provided an answer.

When the comments were analysed and themed, seven key themes were identified. These are illustrated in the table below.

Have you been a victim of crime?

Less than half (46%) of respondents said they have been a victim of crime. This is illustrated in the table below.

Did the crime take place in Richmond Borough?

Respondents who indicated that they had been a victim of crime were asked whether the crime took place in Richmond Borough. Of the 29 respondents that answered 'yes' to the question, over four-fifths (83%) said that the crime took place in Richmond. This is shown in the table below.

When did the crime take place?

Respondents who said they had been a victim of crime were asked when the crime took place. 45% said the crime took place in the last year, while 38% said it happened more than five years ago. These results are illustrated in the table below.

Please tell us any other comments you would like to make:

This was an open question which allowed respondents to provide other comments. 23 respondents provided an answer.

When the comments were analysed and themed, one main theme was identified. Eight respondents (35%) mentioned a perceived need for increased numbers of police officers, a more visible presence by officers and/or increased support for the police services.



Appendix 2: Press Release

Richmond is the safest borough for violent and race hate crime

Release Date: 13 June 2017

A report released on 12 June by the Richmond Community Safety Partnership confirms that over the past twelve months Richmond remains the safest borough in London for violent and race hate crime.

In addition, burglary offences over the past year remain almost level with 921 crimes compared to 917 the previous year.

However, the borough has seen a rise in vehicle crimes with a 32% rise in offences (1279). In addition, the Police have seen a 7% rise in calls regarding anti-social behaviour.

With that in mind, the Community Safety Partnership is asking residents their views on future priority areas for the next twelve months.

The Community Safety plan is refreshed annually to address crime patterns and residents' perceptions of crime. It can look at areas such as burglary, domestic abuse, anti-social behaviour and road safety.

Residents can have their say in a consultation until 10 July.

Richmond Council's Cabinet Member for Community Safety, Cllr Stephen Speak, said:

"Against a backdrop of rising crime across London I am pleased that Richmond remains one of London's safest boroughs. However, the Council will continue to strive for further improvements by working closely with the Police and our other partners.

"Recent reductions in the theft of two wheelers demonstrates how joint working through the Richmond Community Safety Partnership can reduce crime. However, there are still disappointingly many crimes where property has been left insecure at home and on display in vehicles. This encourages the opportunist thief to commit crime and residents and visitors to the borough must remain aware.

"I hope that through this consultation, residents will better understand the local backdrop and the steps that everyone can take to reduce crime. Most importantly however we want to hear residents' views about the Partnership's crime reduction and community safety priorities."
