1. Summary

After careful consideration, Wandsworth Council has made the difficult decision to consult on a proposal to close Broadwater Primary School in the Summer Term of 2023, with the intention to repurpose the site for Special Needs School provision. If the expansion of Paddock Special School on the site is approved, this will provide approximately 190 places to local pupils with complex special needs to meet increasing demand in the borough.

This proposal is driven by our collective aspirations for children with SEND to have their needs met locally, keeping them close to their families and friends and the need to retain a sustainable school system.

Due to the increase in demand for specialist places there is no longer sufficient capacity within our own existing special school provision, and we are having to commission places outside of Wandsworth, often in independent schools. Currently therefore, many of our young people with SEND have to travel long distances to attend schools away from their communities. This comes not only at a financial cost but also, more significantly, to children themselves, their families, and our local schools.

This need for additional specialist SEND provision has coincided with falling pupil numbers in mainstream primary schools across London, including in Wandsworth. This has been caused by families leaving the city as a consequence of Brexit and the pandemic and has resulted in a surplus of primary school places.

To address these two issues, we have been required to take decisive action and think creatively to both secure additional necessary specialist SEND capacity, as well as reducing surplus school places in the primary sector. This proposal for the repurposing of

the Broadwater school site is able to address both of these aims and it is important for the council to be very clear that it is for these reasons alone that this proposal was developed, and it is no reflection on the quality of teaching, or the staff and leadership of the school.

We are committed, through this consultation stage, to listening to and act on the views and concerns of those affected, and to providing the details and reassurance to mitigate the risk of any future changes. We understand that this proposal will inevitably impact on the children, parents and teachers of the Broadwater school community but also acknowledge that no proposals will ever have universal support. These difficult decisions have been taken in the wider interest of all children and families in Wandsworth.

This EINA has found that the proposed closure of the school would affect current pupils at the school. As BME pupils and pupils with EAL are overrepresented compared to the 2011 ward census profile in the pupil population this could potentially negatively affect BME pupils. The proportion of pupils in receipt of FSM at Broadwater is higher than the borough average. IDACI data also indicates that those families in the three most sensitive bands are over-represented in the school population. Therefore, the proposal could potentially negatively affect these vulnerable groups of children.

To mitigate against the impact on local applicants, the council has also assured itself that there are sufficient places in the local area for current pupils and future projected pupil numbers. The proposal is also linked to a proposal to repurpose the school site to secure additional necessary specialist SEND capacity which would have a positive impact for pupils with SEND.

This EINA has been updated following the findings of the pre-publication consultation. Additional information has been added about Pupils in receipt of free school meals and Income deprivation affecting children index (IDACI) data as an indicator of deprivation and also pupils who have English as an additional language.

The proposals are subject to further statutory consultation and this EINA will be updated with any additional findings from this.

The proposed closure of the school would affect current pupils at the school. The proportion of pupils known to Social Care at Broadwater is higher than the borough average. This can include children in need and children under a Child protection Plan. Therefore, the proposal could potentially negatively affect these vulnerable groups of children.

To mitigate against this, targeted support will be made available through the Council's Social care teams.

The council has also assured itself that there are sufficient places in the local area for current pupils and future projected pupil numbers. There are sufficient places in good local school across the year groups to accommodate the Broadwater cohort within 1 mile of their home subject to parental preference.

Parents would also have a right of appeal to an independent appeal panel in the event that it is not
