1. Summary

After careful consideration, Wandsworth Council has made the difficult decision to consult on a proposal to close Broadwater Primary School in the Summer Term of 2023, with the intention to repurpose the site for a Special Needs School. If the Special School is approved, this will provide approximately 190 places to local pupils with complex special needs to meet increasing demand in the borough.

This proposal is driven by our collective aspirations for children with SEND to have their needs met locally, keeping them close to their families and friends and the need to retain a sustainable school system.

Due to the increase in demand for specialist places there is no longer sufficient capacity within our own existing special school provision, and we are having to commission places outside of Wandsworth, often in independent schools. Currently therefore, many of our young people with SEND have to travel long distances to attend schools away from their communities. This comes not only at a financial cost but also, more significantly, to children themselves, their families and our local schools.

This need for additional specialist SEND provision has coincided with falling pupil numbers in mainstream primary schools across London, including in Wandsworth. This has been caused by families leaving the city as a consequence of Brexit and the pandemic and has resulted in a surplus of primary school places.

To address these two issues, we have been required to take decisive action and think creatively to both secure additional necessary specialist SEND capacity, as well as reducing surplus school places in the primary sector. This proposal for the repurposing of

the Broadwater school site is able to address both of these aims and it is important for the council to be very clear that it is for these reasons alone that this proposal was developed, and it is no reflection on the quality of teaching, or the staff and leadership of the school.

We are committed, through this consultation stage, to listening to and act on the views and concerns of those affected, and to providing the details and reassurance to mitigate the risk of any future changes. We understand that this proposal will inevitably impact on the children, parents and teachers of the Broadwater school community but also acknowledge that no proposals will ever have universal support. These difficult decisions have been taken in the wider interest of all children and families in Wandsworth.

This EINA has found that the proposed closure of the school would affect current pupils at the school. As BME pupils are overrepresented compared to the 2011 ward census profile in the pupil population this could potentially negatively affect BME pupils. To mitigate against the impact on local applicants, the council has also assured itself that there are sufficient places in the local area for current pupils and future projected pupil numbers. The proposal is also linked to a proposal to repurpose the school site to secure additional necessary specialist SEND capacity which would have a positive impact for pupils with SEND.

The proposals are subject to statutory consultation and this EINA will be updated with any additional findings from this.

	Preparatory work suggests sufficiency of places in local schools with 324 vacancies in the 0-1km home to school distance and 622 vacancies in the 0-1.5km home to school distance across the Rec – Yr 5 age range.
Disability	6 (4%) children at Broadwater have an EHCP and 1 child is under assessment. 4 of the 6 children with EHCPs have siblings, which we will consider in our admissions planning. School preferences have already been discussed with these families and these spread a range of schools. Only 1 parent is requesting a school which is not their nearest and so the changes will have minimal impact on transportation.
	According to May 2022 school census, in addition, 14% of pupils at the school receive SEN support. The proportion of pupils with an EHCP or receiving SEN support is similar to the profile for all primary schools in Wandsworth which were 4% and 14 % respectively in May.

Age	In line with the national School Admissions Code, school places are allocated using published admissions criteria. The proposed changes relate to children and young people of primary statutory school age. Admissions to schools are a function that operates within a statutory framework. Wandsworth is the admission authority for community schools and there are arrangements and criteria for the admission of pupils to nursery, primary mainstream schools. There are sufficient places in good local school across the year groups to accommodate the Broadwater cohort with 85% offer a school within 1km of their home and 97% within 1.5km. Currently, only 19% of the Broadwater cohort live within 1km of the school.	Any school closure resulting in the need for a child to change school will be disruptive to their education. However, to mitigate this impact we will work with staff on a transition plan for children as they move to a new school and think about the positive learning opportunities. The closure may affect siblings of pupils attending Broadwater if they intended to attend the same school. The Council would ensure that appropriate provisions are in place for any displaced pupils. They would ensure that parental preference and family circumstances such as siblings are considered when offering school places to minimise the impact on families wherever possible.
